A LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDER

INSPIRED BY A THIRD GRADE STUDENT 2,250 MILES AWAY

Despite launching several campaigns consisting of personal calls, sending letters and emails, and filling out endless contact forms, I failed to gain the interest of local, county, or state governments, and their agencies. Coincidentally, weeks later and on the same day, I received two calls. Neither were on my original distribution list. They explained why this known problem had been allowed to exist and worsen. The reasons given included; they were unsure who ultimately was responsible, it was not a high enough priority, and wasn't in their budget.



No one wanted to accept responsibility.

Not to be deterred, I sought out the owner of the railroad bridge where for years, piles of trees, logs, and other natural debris had collected and choked the Grand River. Behind it were large stagnant pools of litter, trash, and other evidence of urban living. I learned this bridge was owned by Adrian and Blissfield Railroad Company (ADBF) headquartered in Okemos.

I reached out to ADBF over a weekend. Monday morning the company president called. We met that afternoon and agreed to a plan to clear this river-wide blockage and its pooled pollution the following Thursday.

Via the collaborative efforts of the new owners of ADBF and team of environmentally-minded paddlers, this long-standing, neglected stretch of river was transformed. It was now safe to navigate and became one of the most scenic sections of river in urban Lansing. It shows the joy and ease with which we can accomplish great things when working together.

There was still much more to do as Lansing rivers were often described as paddling or fishing in a garbage dump. People purposely avoided this area and it reflected poorly on Lansing and our state.

My decision to create Michigan Waterways Stewards and expand our waterways stewardship was not the result of the appreciation from the outdoor community, the many emails from the general public giving thanks, or EGLE encouraging us to help elsewhere. My commitment to expand our work was triggered by a chance meeting with an eight-year-old, in a third grade class 2,250 miles away.

This past winter I traveled to California to visit with my daughters and eight-year-old granddaughter. I asked them to not tell Lola so I could surprise her. With the help of her third-grade teacher, our plan was put in motion. I would surprise her while she was at school and in class.




RIVER ANGELS IN ACTION




FRIENDS OF THE LOOKING GLASS RIVER CLEANUP

With Lola seated at a small table in front, with her back to the door, we quietly entered. The teacher gave no hint of our arrival. As I walked toward Lola, her friends sitting across from her and other classmates noticed my approach. I raised my index finger to my face, and with a smile, I asked them to keep quiet.

Everyone was in on our plan.

Standing behind her, I watched Lola working on her tablet. So focused she did not sense my presence. Impatient, and unable to wait any longer, I reached over her left shoulder and pointed to her tablet. Thinking I must be her teacher she didn't give it much thought. But when she looked up and saw her teacher in the front of the classroom, she knew something wasn't right.

Unsure who was standing behind her, she looked back over her left shoulder. She couldn't make sense of it, "How is it that Grandpa is here? He lives so far away."

While trying to make sense of it, she slowly stood up and gave me that long hug every grandparent covets. A short while later she unexpectedly broke away and walked across the room. With her hand cupped against her friend's ear, she whispered something that only he could hear.

Several minutes passed before this same young boy stood up and walked across the room. With his outstretched hand, he reached out for mine and said, "Thank you for the work you're doing to save the world." Surprised, all I could think of saying was, "Aww. Thank you. It is my pleasure." I looked around, to Lola, and then to the teacher, and said with my eyes, "WOW. What an honor!"

It wasn't what he said, nor his gentle kindness and sincere appreciation that nearly brought me to tears. Instead, it was the realization that my granddaughter was so proud of my conservation efforts, that it meant so much to her, that she boasted to others about what I did. And they too, were thankful.

I started Michigan Waterways Stewards because in the

eyes of eight-year-olds we are saving the world and they are genuinely thankful. Is there anything more important than to awe and inspire, and to lead by example?
